Some words from the Chair about the current L2 Arb course.

The Level 2 Arboriculture students are currently studying Biology. We've looked at taxonomy and nomenclature, which could be a bit of a dry start to this module, but it's interesting. We have been looking at binomial scientific names; these are normally in Latin and made up of the Genus and the specific epithet. They are italicised and the genus has a capital letter.

For example, *Quercus* (the genus) *ilex* (specific epithet) is the Holm Oak or Holly Oak. Its leaves look like the leaves of holly, so it's named after the holly tree, whose binomal name is *llex aquifolium*.

The scientific, Latin name, or binomial gives clues about a tree and what it looks like, how it grows, or even where it's from. You don't need to know any Latin, as many English words come from Latin, and so you can take a guess. *Quercus rubra* - we know from the genus that it's an oak, but the rubra? Think of rubies. They're red, so this is the Red Oak. Salix caprea - this is a willow - the Salix gave its name to salicylic acid, which is commonly known as aspirin. And *caprea*? Well, think of Capricorn - it's a goat, so this is the goat willow.

If you're interested, there are books like 'Plant Names Simplified' by Johnson, Smith and Stockdale, or plenty of internet sites.

As we approach the seed gathering and tree planting season, BTP have been preparing to enter two initial priority wards – Nechells, where we have previously worked with two of our volunteers in conjunction with The Woodland Trust, and also Newtown, where the newly proposed TreePlotter maps are available (see page 4) – and we would like to ask our volunteers and any Green Champions in and around that area to get in touch with us.

We would like to work and engage with local residential, faith, school, mental health, and other community groups within those areas, to increase the awareness and understanding of the benefits of trees. As part of our planting strategy, the community will play a large part, as our Engagement and Communications Officers are working diligently to promote trees and forge lasting networking bonds with groups in our target areas. TreePlotter: Tree Planting Strategy

As part of the recently published Urban Forest Master Plan (UFMP), Birmingham TreePeople (BTP) have presently turned their attention to their tree planting strategy, which is a key priority for the UFMP and the upcoming planting season. Tree equity has been propelled to the forefront of our tree planting efforts, to target priority wards with high deprivation and low canopy cover. To help engage residents and ensure the successful establishment of trees. TreePlotter has been employed to easily record and alter the propositioned locations, and once the maps are finalised more can and will be added in the future.


These are the proposed planting spots that BTP are
